




CITY OF CLEMSON 2022 YEAR IN REVIEW

- Completed the pump track at Clemson Park.
- Acquired 3.47 acres at the corner of Berkeley Drive and Issaqueena Trail to develop a passive park and safe trail connection. Council is conceptualizing an Orchard for this location that people can enjoy and do something with the land that allows it to produce for the community. [More information](#)
- Finished the Police Department expansion, including upgrading the 911 Center.
- Upgraded public cameras to aid in detecting and solving crimes.
